H2303: MARIJUANA; LABORATORIES; PROFICIENCY TESTING

| Beginning January 1, 2023, the Department of Health Services (DHS) is required, instead of allowed, to conduct proficiency testing and remediate problems with independent third-party laboratories that are certified to test medical marijuana. DHS is allowed to conduct proficiency testing and remediate problems with marijuana testing facilities through December 31, 2022, and is required to do so beginning January 1, 2023. DHS is authorized to use monies in the Medical Marijuana Fund to contract with laboratories to conduct proficiency testing requirements. Due to voter protection, this legislation requires the affirmative vote of at least 3/4 of the members of each house of the Legislature for passage. H2454: TELEHEALTH; HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS; REQUIREMENTS

Modifies the requirements for health and disability insurers to cover telehealth services. Insurers are required to reimburse health care providers at the same level of payment for equivalent services whether provided through telehealth using an audiovisual format or in-person care. Does not apply to a telehealth encounter provided through a platform sponsored or provided by For Vote the insurer. Insurers cannot require a health care provider to use a telehealth platform sponsored or provided by the insurer as Analysis: a condition of network participation. The definition of "telehealth" is expanded to include the use of an audio-only telephone encounter between an insured and a health care provider if specified conditions are met. Establishes a 27-member Telehealth Advisory Committee on Telehealth Best Practices to review standards for telehealth best practices and relevant peer-reviewed ort literature, and to adopt telehealth best practice guidelines and recommendations. Factors the Committee must consider when doing so are listed. The Committee is required to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature by December 1, 2021. Beginning January 1, 2022, insurers are required to cover services provided through an audioonly telehealth encounter if the Committee recommends that the services may appropriately be provided in that manner. Before January 1, 2022, insurers are required to cover services provided through an audio-only telehealth encounter if that service is ral covered by Medicare or the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System when provided in this manner. A health care provider regulatory board or agency is prohibited from enforcing any statute, rule or policy that would require a health care provider who is licensed by that board or agency and who is authorized to write prescriptions to require an in-person examination of the patient before issuing a prescription, except as specifically prescribed by federal law. Consistent with the best practice guidelines adopted by the Committee, health care providers are required to make a good faith effort to use best practices in determining whether a health care service should be provided through telehealth instead of in person, and in determining the communication medium of telehealth. Network adequacy standards required by state or federal law cannot be met by an insurer through the use of contracted health care providers who provide only telehealth services and do not provide in-person health care services in Arizona. Health care providers who are licensed in another state are authorized to provide telehealth services to a person in Arizona if the provider complies with a list of requirements, including maintaining liability insurance and following community of care standards. By September 1, 2021 or 30 days after the effective date of this legislation, whichever is earlier, the Department of Health Services is required to develop a three-year pilot program that allows the delivery of acute care services to patients in the patient's home by licensed hospitals in Arizona working in coordination with licensed home health professionals. By March 31, 2023, the Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions is required to report specified information on telehealth encounters to the Legislature. Emergency clause. H2682: TOBACCO PRODUCTS; VAPOR PRODUCTS; RETAIL SALES (PHARMACY BOARD; RULEMAKING AUTHORITY)

The powers and duties of the Department of Liquor Licenses and Control (DLLC) are expanded to include enforcing statute regulating tobacco sales, investigating the sales of "alternative nicotine products," "tobacco products," or "vapor products" (all defined) to persons under the 21 years of age, causing these products to be removed from the marketplace if they may be For Vote contaminated, and taking other regulatory actions related to these products. Beginning January 1, 2023, a retail tobacco vender Analysis: is prohibited from distributing alternative nicotine products, tobacco products or vapor products in Arizona without a valid tobacco retail sales license issued by DLLC. The DLLC is required to establish fees for an initial license or renewal license. A license is valid for one year, and a license is not transferable. It is unlawful for a retail tobacco vendor to sell, furnish, give or provide an ort alternative nicotine product, tobacco product or vapor product to a person who is under 21 years of age. No later than 45 days after the determination, each agency identified by the project sponsor is required to submit to the Director all anticipated authorizations required for the participating project, including the target completion time for each step required. Agencies cannot require an eligible project to ral participate in the Permitting Dashboard. Establishes a process for resolution of disputes relating to the permitting timetable. Permitting Dashboard provisions self-repeal January 1, 2029. Contracts for goods and services approved by the Public Safety Personnel Retirement System Board (PSPRS Board) are no longer exempt from the Procurement Code. The PSPRS Board is required to establish and administer an Administration Account. Monies that must be deposited in the Administration Account and expenditures that must be paid from the Administration Account are listed. Establishes the Major Events Fund to be administered by the Arizona Commerce Authority and used to support the planning and operation of the competitive bid process for major events in coordination with the Office of Tourism and for other economic development activities associated with major event operations. Liabilities in excess of \$200,000 incurred by the Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management during an emergency arising from major disasters may be reimbursed with the approval of the Governor or State Emergency Council. The Director of the Arizona Legislative Council is required to direct and manage the State Capitol Museum and administer the Museum Gift Shop Revolving Fund. Modifies deadlines for various reports to the Governor and the Legislature. Session law affirms that the legal defense of state election laws and procedures is of statewide importance and the Attorney General has the sole authority to defend such laws. The Attorney General is prohibited from representing or providing legal advice to the Secretary of State or the Department of State on any matters through June 30, 2023. The Secretary of State is authorized to hire one FTE position to serve as legal advisor and represent the Secretary of State, but the Secretary is prohibited from making expenditures or incurring indebtedness to employ outside or private attorneys to provide representation or services. Requires any unrestricted federal monies received by Arizona in FY2021-22 to be deposited in the general fund. Maintains the Capital Outlay Stabilization Fund rental rates for state-owned buildings of \$17.87/square foot for office space and \$6.43/square foot for storage space. For FY2021-22, FY2022-23, and FY2023-24, the Legislature is not required to appropriate monies to or transfer monies from the Budget Stabilization Fund. Before spending monies from specified funds as appropriated by the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 in the amount of \$10 million or more for one designated purpose, the Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the Arizona Board of Regents are each required to notify the Legislature of the intended use of the monies. 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S1680: NEWBORN SCREENING PROGRAM; TESTING

The newborn screening program is required to include all congenital disorders that are included on the recommended uniform screening panel adopted by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for both core and secondary conditions. Beginning January 1, 2022, disorders that are added to the core and secondary conditions list of the recommended For Vote uniform screening panel must be added to Arizona's newborn screening panel within two years after their addition. The Analysis: Department of Health Services (DHS) is required to present any change to the newborn screening program fee to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee for review. No later than 60 days after DHS adjusts the fee, health insurers and the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) are required to update hospital rates that include newborn screening to reflect the increase. Session law requires DHS to add spinal muscular atrophy and x-linked adrenoleukodystrophy to Arizona's newborn screening panel by December 31, 2021 and to add all remaining core and secondary conditions that are included on the se recommended uniform screening panel as of December 31, 2021 to Arizona's newborn screening panel by December 31, 2023.
